CHILDREN OF THE WILD ECOURSE

This is a course that is dear to my heart. I have had pets all my life. I love the joy and gentleness they bring to my life. But it was only till I started rescuing dogs that gave me the deeper meaning to their importance in my life.

When I lived in Los Angeles and worked for the apparel business I met a group of women in the industry that helped rescue and care for abandoned dogs. People would take a box of puppies and just leave them downtown to fend for themselves! Those abandoned puppies grew up and started mating with other dogs and the story goes on and on! We found dogs amongst the rubble and dark under paths. It was quite a scene, all these women dressed up wearing heels out on our lunch break seeking and taking care of as many dogs as possible. There are countless homeless people downtown and we would match them up with a pet and pay for their vet bills and food. It was amazing to see these animals bring some joy to these people. We rescued bait dogs in East LA which was always heartbreaking. These dogs were used as bait for dog fighting. There are stories of success but many stories of heartbreak. I have long gone from that scene and I am sure that there are many people taking my place. It was some of the finest work I have ever done.

I really am not much of a story teller so I wasn't sure how I would structure this class. I only knew the kind of images I was drawn to and created them for this course. After I finished the painting, I was asked to submit one of the pieces to a gallery that shows my work. I was told to create a story around it which I did and it was so much fun to do! I have included it in this course and decided to create stories for all the pieces. My process here was to paint and tell the story afterwards rather than the other way around. That seems to work for me!

What else is important about creating a story is to start creating art that is personal to me. I have been painting for 6 years learning my craft and now it is time to express why I do the art I do. It was such good advice. You need the time to hone your skills for some years (they say anywhere from 5-6 years of continuous study before developing the work that is meaningful and personal to me. I used to paint things that I liked aesthetically but I can only go so far with that. To continue to be interested and engaged with the work it has to personal.

For this class I am using many different mediums for each painting. I like to push the envelope and try and create mystery so you really don't know exactly what was used. It is fun. That is why I am a mixed media artist. I can't just use 1 medium. I also like to use pencil marks in all my pieces. I like that some areas aren't finished and covered with paint so you can see some of the other areas. It is like an old wall that has aged to the point of seeing parts that are underneath. That seems to be a thread throughout my work.

I have a video that goes over all the supplies and how I use them in each project. I suggest you do the exercises first before jumping into the paintings. We work on 4 foxes and I demonstrate the different techniques for the larger paintings. This is a good way to experiment and see what techniques and mediums you like the best without being overwhelmed in creating a piece of art because I really do work with these mediums in unconventional ways.

VIDEO ONE INTRODUCTION

The following videos goes over some supplies and the techniques for each of the finished pieces. I have used the same image to demonstrate 4 different techniques. You will become more familiar with the supplies as well as deciding which supplies you adore. I hate to have students buy everything only to find out it isn't for them. This way you can see how I use them. I also wanted to show the techniques in a more fun and explorative way. You are not working on a finished piece of art so you will have the freedom to play . You may want to take one or two of the techniques and do a few small samples. I save these samples because often I forget techniques that I may really enjoy because I sold the artwork and the inspiration is gone. Having sample pieces as well as putting these ideas in my sketchbook is so very valuable! I often go through my sketchbook and see something I forgot that was really cool...so save these sample techniques. You may find you want to try a couple of different ones than the ones I share. Put your own spin on it.

I also have a video that goes over a few more supplies as well as mapping a photo to understand proportions. This is especially important for drawing children, which have very different proportions than adults. I go over a little bit of structure

of some of the animals but it is pretty loose. I am not painting realistic animals but having a basic structure helps.

BOYWITHADEERHEAD



This gave her the boost she needed to get on with it. The Wild One decided to fight and fight she did. At first she crawled out of her bed and eventually limped her way towards the forest. She heard a message to climb; climb the tallest tree in the forest. She gazed up at the tree and could not even see the tree top underneath the clouds. It really didn't look that tempting to her and her disappointment almost drove her back to the bed. As she was limping away the light at the top caught her eye. Something shimmery but dark and dense. I am happy to say that that piece has been sold through a gallery that sells my art! But don't worry, in the next piece I go over how I applied the oil bars so that you can fill in the gaps!






TWO GIRLS WITH A RABBIT AND FOX HEADDRESSES




BONUS PROJECT!!!

I have used Photoshop to superimpose these two images. I first use my photo of Karter and I. I make the photo sepia tone with my color options. I then overlay this image with my artwork of Bird's Nest Girl and lower the opacity to show the layer underneath.

You can do the same sequence using a photo app such as Image Blender or Diana where you can layer the two layers and manipulate the opacity to get the same results.
